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
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# **Message from the President**

Ankeny School Days - Old and New

Did you know the first school inside the town of Ankeny was located on about the same place as the museum is today? We don't mean "Central" that was built in 1909 and had students from kindergarten to twelfth grade. There was a different school dated back to the 1850s. It was a small one-room log school house with a handful of students, and it was moved several times before landing at SW 3<sup>rd</sup> and SW School Streets. Eventually, it was replaced by Central that stayed until the tornado of 1974 damaged it enough for condemnation.

There were eight other one room school houses around the outside of the town center. Maybe, you've heard of some of them: Greenwood, Oralabor, Union, Sexauer, Enterprise, Riley, Nagle and Prairie Green. Pictures of these old schools are displayed in the barn at the museum, and a new video shows the evolution of the schools.


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## A Message From the President—continued

From these humble beginnings, Ankeny Schools have expanded into what we have today. Neveln School,

built in the 1920's, was named after the first superintendent Ed Neveln and housed the high school (and later, some junior high classes). As the city grew, so did the number of schools. In 1951, Parkview elementary was built, followed by Northwest, East, Southeast, Northeast, Terrace, Crocker, Ashland Ridge, Rock Creek, Prairie Trail, Westwood, Heritage elementary schools (and Abbie Grove in 2024). Two high schools (Ankeny and Centennial) and four middle schools (Northview, Prairie Ridge, Southview, and Parkview) complete the list.

The Ankeny Area Historical Society has always been affiliated with our schools. First, we are located on school property at 3<sup>rd</sup> and School Streets. We also invite students



to visit on field trips and school work days. The museum has dedicated a portion of the barn to our schools, and recently added a display of all the school sports championships over the years.

In April, three of us from the Society were invited to participate in the Ankeny Superintendent Dr. Erick Pruitt's podcast, where he invites local representatives to discuss different areas of city interest. JoAnn Adamson, Evan Albaugh (local college intern), and I were able to discuss Ankeny's history ... and the Society's history ... and how they have changed over the years. This was a great activity for us, as it gave us a chance to do what we enjoy so much – talking about Ankeny's history – and emphasized the combination of "old and new." Using technology to spread the conversation – it's a wonderful way to move into the future with the artifacts of days gone by. We hope you will visit the museum this year and see for yourself all the delightful items on display and learn a little bit more about our fine city.

Our gratitude to Mark for sharing his family heritage at this fun presentation and preserving this history for future generations!
















# New Exhibit at The Ankeny Area Historical Society: Ankeny Incorporates 1903


much needed mulch into the landscaping.


