Services Held Tuesday for E.W. Neveln, Retired Superintendent of Schools.

Services were held for E.W. Neveln at Dahlstrom Funeral Homes in Des Moines with burial at Oralabor (Cemetery). Mr. Neveln had been superintendent on the Ankeny Schools for 23 years when he retired in 1944. He was born in Victor and moved to Ankeny in 1919. He graduated from Iowa State Teachers College, attended the State University of Iowa, and received his bachelor and master of arts degree from Drake University.

He was a veteran of World War I. Mr. Neveln was president of the Polk County Taxpayer's Association and a member of the Greater Des Moines Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Neveln was a past master of the Masonic Lodge in Ankeny, a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, a past commander of Albaugh-McGovern Post of the American Legion, and was a member of the Polk County draft board during both wars. After his retirement, Mr. Neveln operated a farm near Ankeny. He was a member of the Methodist Church. Ankeny Times, February 19, 1959

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Ankeny Takes First Round Game 42-28. Ankeny's basketball team had no trouble stopping Bridgewater-Fontanelle, 42-28, in the first round Class A district tournament game at East Monday. It was defense more than anything that helped late-blooming Ankeny to its twelfth victory in 18 starts. The Hawks, not expected to get past the sectionals, play Carroll Thursday. Ankeny moved to a 14-3 lead and John Moore, high scorer with 16 points pushed through the last three baskets as Ankeny made it 24-14. Bridgewater cut the Ankeny advantage to 30-24 in the third period but Ankeny bore down and held its opponent scoreless for the next 6 minutes. *Ankeny Times, February 26, 1959*



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

The Ankeny Hawks took five of the six final matches as they won the Central lowa Conference tournament title compiling 96 points compared to second place Urbandale's 85. Asa Hutton and Joe Smith started things going by placing second. Eric Norris was Ankeny's first individual champion of the day as he pinned Phil Neville of South Tama. Seven industries locate in Ankeny during 1970. Elect officers, directors at annual meeting. Ankeny's industrial park attracted seven new industries in 1970, the industrial corporation was told at its annual meeting Monday. Jerry Fulton, Executive director of the corporation, told of the impact that the industrial park on the city's economy in his annual report. Fulton explained that the year's growth brought the total number of industries in the park to 15. He said that the estimate taxable value of the ground and building already developed exceed 16 million dollars. Fulton said that the industrial park, located at the southeast city limits, has created 284 new jobs in the community and has created a need for 75 new residents. New businesses or industries located in Ankeny during the years were: Quality Machine Co., Warren-Nelson Constructions Co., Arndt Keyboard Entertainment Products Manufacturing Company, Thorpe Well Co., and Lowy Carpet. 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



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Don Hick Honored for 50 years at D & P.

Bryant Denniston, president of Denniston and Partridge Lumber Company presented Don Hick with a service award for fifty years of employment with the company. The award was given at the company's Christmas party held December 22nd at Elwell's Restaurant. Hick started working for D & P in 1929 at Altoona. In 1939 he was sent to Liscomb where he managed the lumber yard there until January of 1941 when he went into the Army. Upon discharge in the latter part of 1945, he worked in the general office at Newton. He then managed the Mingo yard until 1946. Hick managed the Ankeny yard from 1946 until 1969 when he was promoted to General Supervisor for all the D & P yards. When he came to Ankeny the population was 785. He started the first housing dubdivision in Ankeny 9n 1947 and has seen the town grow to 16,500. In 1970 Hick received the "Outstanding Citizen" award from the Ankeny Chamber of Commerce for general community service Ankeny Press-Citizen, February 5, 1981

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Chamber Home Taking Shape. The permanent home for the Ankeny Chamber of Commerce and the Ankeny Industrial Development Corporation has taken shape at the southeast corner of SW Third and Elm Streets.

Chamber members are supposed to be "all over town" but that is also where their office has been in the last ten years. When the city acquired the Delmar Kobi property in the fall of 1979 they moved from the white house next to City Hall to make way for the Municipal Building addition. Chamber executive director Jean Jones made special note of the savings to the project by the use of Des Moines Area Community College students in the work – study program of the college's Building Trades department. The student work on the Chamber / IDC building includes trim carpentry, the building of a reception area desk and kitchen cabinets and storage closet shelves. 


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Chairs Redevelopment Committee. Bill Duncan is chairman for the Ankeny Uptown Redevelopment Committee. His faith in the present and future of the area is expressed in the development and expansion of Bear's, House of Good Food and Spirits. The building located at 302 SW Maple Street, is the fourth oldest, still standing business structure in Ankeny. It was built in 1912. Duncan and Jody Wilson opened the doors of Big Bear's in September of 1967 as a neighborhood tavern, seating 42 people, serving 80% spirits and 20% food, with the service of 500 sandwiches a week considered tops. Bear's now seats 84 people (with plans for seating 20 more), services 30% spirits and 70% food, with a sandwich business of 2500 a week. Ankeny Press-Citizen, February 19, 1981
