## 1940's

**Fire Destroys Half Ankeny Business Area:** A raging fire destroyed half of the Ankeny business section causing an estimated \$50,000 loss. Five stores covering a half block area burned to the



ground during the blaze which consisted of the following places: Lamberti meat market and grocery store, Thompson harness shop, the office of Dr. Henderson, veterinarian, Wright Pharmacy, Sexton cafe, and Margaret's Beauty Shoppe, where the fire originated. The fire department was called but it had gained such a start before being discovered and there was a strong wind blowing, which made it difficult to check. This was the third major blaze in Ankeny in the past ten years. *Ankeny Times, May 17, 1940*

April 15: The fourth annual COFFEE DAY FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN will be held throughout lowa on Friday, April 15, it was announced today by Thomas Teas, president of the Iowa Society for Crippled Children and Adults, and Harold Enquist of the Breese House, Ankeny, who is serving as state-wide COFFEE DAY chairman. In some areas, the regular system will prevail whereby patrons "pay" for their coffee by putting their contributions in special containers provided in the restaurants and cafes. Funds raised on COFFEE DAY go toward the special residential summer camp for Iowa's crippled children now under construction near Ankeny in central Iowa. *Ankeny Times, April 7, 1960*

#### Over 400 Attend P.T.A.

Meeting: A crowd of over 400 attended the Jr. Sr. High PTA meeting which was held at Parkview Auditorium on Monday evening, April 18. This meeting was the annual Style Show and Industrial Arts Exhibit and for the first time, a Science Fair was included. The Industrial Arts exhibit, which was set up in the rear of the auditorium, included many articles such as coffee tables, gun racks, lawn chairs, fruit bowls, book cases and cabinets which the boys had made under the direction of Mr. Scott, their instructor. The cafeteria was filled with scientific exhibits of all descriptions, ranging from "coal flowers" from the lower grades to cages of white mice demonstrating vitamin deficiencies, photomicrotography and more advance scientific experiments conducted by upper grade students. Mr. Carlson and Mr. Crosser were the teachers in charge of this exhibit, and it is evident that the younger generation is taking an avid interest in the scientific aspects of the world about us. The business meeting was called to order by Mrs. Kenneth Scholes, President. Following the readying of the minutes and Treasurer's report, Mrs. Wm. Marvin, Chairman of the nominating presented the slate of officers for the coming year. 
