

Ninth Grade- 65



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
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
#### **Labor Day Celebration Here is Huge Success**

A gay, colorful parade-The Ankeny Park crowded with fun loving people-and the serving of about 1,100 barbequed chicken dinners marked Labor Day, 1958 in Ankeny. Following a dark and dreary morning, Mother Nature cooperated fully as hundreds of people lined the streets of Ankeny as the parade got underway at 1:30. It was the longest and most colorful ever witnessed here as over 200 entries paraded before the throng. It measured over one mile in length. The people who witnessed the gala affair were very receptive to entries, and applause could the parade route. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, September 4, 1958*

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#### **Ankeny Due to Share Half-Million Dollars**

The town of Ankeny eventually will get a share of an estimated half-million dollar estate left by two brothers who farmed for many years 3 miles northeast of Ankeny. Attorney Francis V. Hall of Ankeny, executor of the estate of Clarence H. and Lee Kirkendall, estimated the value of the brothers' property at "between \$400,000 and \$500,00 less taxes." Clarence died at 78 on December 20, 1956. He left no will. His sole heir was his brother, Lee, who died at 84 on July 21, 1957 at Mercy Hospital filed for probate Monday in Polk County district court here. According to Hall, Lee Kirkendall left a 160-acre farm to Marion Spooner, 52, tenant on the farm, for the life-time of Spooner. Spooner's son Robert, 26, was deeded another 160 acre farm "for his lifetime." On the death of the elder Spooner, that 160 acre farm becomes the property of the First Congregational Church, Ankeny, according to the will. Upon the death of the younger Spooner, that 160 acre farm becomes the property of Ankeny "for the construction of a public library."

**Farms to Tenants:** Lee Kirkendall's will was filed for probate Monday in Polk County district court here. According to Hall, Lee Kirkendall left a 160-acre farm to Marion Spooner, 52, tenant on the farm, for the life-time of Spooner. Spooner's son Robert, 26, was deeded another 160 acre farm "for his lifetime." On the death of the elder Spooner, that 160-acre farm becomes the property of the First Congregational Church, Ankeny, according to the will. Upon the death of the younger Spooner, that 160-acre farm becomes the property of Ankeny "for the construction of a public library."

A total of \$100,000 of the brothers' estate is to be divided among six distant cousins, at least two of the are Iowans. The remainder of the estate goes to the town of Ankeny for a library. Hall estimated that at least "\$25,000, should be available" as soon as the estate is settled. The two brothers were lifetime residents of the Ankeny area. Clarence had been married but his wife died 25 years ago. There were no children. Lee had never married. After the death of Clarence's wife and the death of their mother, the two brothers lived together on a farm until 1948 when they retired and moved to Ankeny. *Ankeny Times, September 5, 1957* 

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




The mapping is needed to locate the exact location of the Company's cable. The maps will be filed with the City and with the utilities, whose poles are used, when they are completed. 



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

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Citizens Propose Crosswalk for Dangerous Highway Crossing. A petition totaling 389 concerned signatures was presented to the Ankeny City Council Monday night suggesting the construction of an overhead crosswalk for US Highway 69 at the NE 5th Street intersection. The petition submitted stated that the overhead skywalk was needed to eliminate the danger of the residents on the busy crossing. Mrs. Orle Rolison of 210 NE 5<sup>th</sup> told the Council that her daughter was recently nipped by a moving vehicle on the intersection while going to school. She stated that her 10-year-old was close to being a fatality as the girl missed being hit head-on by a car which skidded an approximate 75-100 feet. Parents said that five near-misses have been recorded in recent weeks. The situation affects children on the east-side of Ankeny who are in the boundaries of the Terrace Elementary School, which is on the west-side of the city. Approximately 200 school children live in this area. Keith Hopkins, Ankeny Superintendent of Schools, spoke of "human elements" involved in this type of set-up. He said, "All forms of safety devices have problems. I'm sure that ramp is not the total answer. You'll still have some children disregard it no matter what the circumstances are." He spoke up for the school crossing guards who are presently located at all Ankeny elementary schools. About the statistics which were presented (by Mrs. Nancy Horney, who gave pros and cons as well as cost figures), Hopkins said he didn't "give a hoot' about them as they were dealing with the lives of children, not the numbers. Hostesses were Charlene Adams, Kay Bower and Hazel Howard, A moment of silent prayer was observed in memory of two deceased members, Ann Smith and Myrl Juhl. Unity Club, the oldest women's club in Ankeny, was organized in June 1922 with fifteen members. "Unity" meaning "to act in harmony of one accord" was selected for its name. But, by Saturday, her body was going torough withdrawal-including leg cramps-and Long decided to get a quick fix. On Sunday, she hopped back in the saddle and rode from Ankeny to Elkhart and back. From May 28 to Sept. 4, Long rode her bike along with about 275 others of all ages from Long Beach, CA to Washington, D.C. She was part of the bike ride promoting Iowa's '50th birthday in '96. Long 61, slept in school gymnasiums, camped out and stayed with host families along the way. Long and her husband, Fred, went on the trip together. "I couldn't have done it without him," Jean said.

She traveled by bike and he by car. Fred's intentions was to play as many games of golf as possible on the way and then hook up with Jean after she made it to the next destination But that plan didn't work many times. He played golf 14 times in 100 days.

She has 15 rolls of color film, five hours of video-tape and a daily journal to help her remember the trip and the breathtaking scenery. But most of the memories are stored in her mind and her heart. "I thought I was in great condition until we hit the hills of the Pacific Coast highway," Long said. Long said she started riding a bicycle long distance about 11 years ago. She has successfully battled cancer and decided to set a goal to keep in good shape. 

Large enrollment increase is a surprise – Unofficial count shows 236 more students in Ankeny This is a year that Ankeny can handle it. "It is a little higher that we expected it to be," said Superintendent Ben Norman. Norman said new elementary sections were added at Westwood and Northeast. If this unexpected growth continues, it won't be long before the district has to find a whole new plan.

One thing for sure, those 236+ students will get services for a year before the school district get the state aid to pay for them. "We don't get any money for these students until next year," Norman said. Because of a quirky state law, growing school districts like Ankeny have to find their own funds for new students. Based on \$3,626 in per-pupil state aid, Ankeny will miss out on \$855,736 during the 1995-1996 school year. So, how does Ankeny make up for that funding gap? Norma said the School Board typically will use a one-year instructional support levy to make up about \$400,000. "The rest we just absorb into our budget." *Ankeny Press Citizen –Sept.19*, 1995





New apartment complex to serve senior citizens – A 53-unit complex for low-income senior citizens, which will be dedicated Saturday, is already nearly full. The facility, located just behind the Ankeny Wal-Mart, is a part of the government's Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program. It will serve people age62 and over who live on fixed incomes.
