#### Two New Routes Needed for New Service

Willard L. Nagle, Acting Postmaster, has received word from Congressman Paul Cunningham that the Post Office Department has granted Ankeny city mail and parcel post delivery. This has also been confirmed by postal officials. Effective date for the new service will be Saturday, September 6, 1958. All person desiring delivery are urged to make the necessary preparations in advance of the beginning service. All houses must have visible house numbers and mail boxes or a slot in the door marked "mail". Acting Postmaster Nagle further stresses that all the correspondents should be informed of the change and that numbers and streets are now required.

Two Carriers: Mr. Nagle further stated that according to preliminary plans, two carriers will be employed here. Carrier sorting cases will not have patrons' names, only street addresses. Failure to have street addresses will delay mail. Well known businesses in town will not use the number and street on their return mail.

Boxes will still be available for those not desiring delivery. Mr. Nagle also stated that all persons wishing house delivery should file a written request at the post office giving complete name and address. This should be done immediately. *Ankeny Press Citizen, July 31, 1958*

#### Things You Should Do Now

- 1. All houses must have visible house numbers and a mail box or a slot in the door marked "mail". No delivery will be made to houses without these.
- 2. Notify all your correspondents that house number and street are now required for delivery here.
- 3. All patrons wishing house delivery must file a written request with the Postmaster immediately giving name and address or mail will be held at the post office in the lock boxes. General delivery will be only for transients, not permanent residents.
- 4. Delivery will not be made to any house not having an all-weather walk from street to doorway.




**Voters will Decide on Two Issues:** A special town election has been called for August 18, at which time two issues will be presented to the voters of Ankeny.

Municipal Garage Building: One of the issues to be brought before the voters will be that of a municipal garage building, to be used for the storage, repair and servicing of town motor vehicles and other equipment. The ballot calls for contracting indebtedness for such purpose not exceeding \$30,000 and the issue of bonds for the same..... At present, there are no facilities for housing the town fire trucks, motor vehicles and other public owned equipment.

**Term Change:** The second matter to be voted upon on August 18, will be the change of the length of term for members of the town council. At present, councilmen are elected to two-year terms every two years. The question to be submitted to the voters will be changing from two-year terms to four-year terms. Council members will be elected to the four-year terms in alternating even numbered years. If this issue is passed by voters, it will mean their will never be a complete change of the council at one time. At each regular election voters will only vote on either two or three councilmen. *Ankeny Press Citizen, July 16, 1959* 

**Two Polio Cases are recorded in Ankeny:** Two polio cases were recorded in Ankeny during the past week. Mrs. John Harkin, 206 Logan, is a patient at Iowa Lutheran Hospital where she is undergoing treatment. She has the non-paralytic type but is expected to be hospitalized for several weeks. Mrs. Harkin received two polio shots, one just recently.

Billy Marvin, 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Marvin of 646 Kenworthy, is a patient in Blank Memorial Hospital in Des Moines. He has received four polio shots. His case was diagnosed as non-bulbar. Billy is progressing very satisfactorily and doctors anticipate a speedy recovery. *Ankeny Press Citizen, July 30, 1959*







#### **Leedom Takes Over Rotary**



Weather conditions hurt area farmers. "This is probably the worst we've experienced for this time of the year," states Everett Albaugh about his farming operation that he farms with brother Norman. Some say that farmers never had it so good but they would eat their words if they saw what the Albaughs were hoping to salvage out of their field. The two men farm around the Ankeny area, and a lot of their crops have now been replanted due to practically every phase of summer weather. "We had around 24" of rain before the storm came around here and 30" is normal for the year. Now we're almost around there. The wind has done a lot of damage to our crops, also." A lot of the Albaughs' corn has to be discarded due to the brisky winds. The corn leaves wrapped around each other causing them to tie up and stop the needed growing procedures. Hail damage has destroyed plenty of the corn along with beans as they have left numerous bruises. Everett and Norman are hoping to save up to one-half of their crop. 

#### Akers, Duncan named all-state track selection.

Ankeny track co-captains Tom Akers and Jim Duncan landed spots on the Iowa Association of Track Coaches all-state selections. Akers set one Ankeny school record in the 120 high hurdles with a :14.6 effort and was ranked among the state's best in this category. Tom also recorded a time of :19.5 in the 120 yard law hurdles for one of the state's fastest. Duncan finished second in the state long hump event with a leap of 22' 2-1/4". Jim was a member of the Hawks 440, 880, medley, and the mile relays which set personal bests for the 1974 track season. They led Ankeny to championships in the CIC indoor, CIC outdoor, Hawk Relays, Urbandale Relays, and the Ram Relays. *Ankeny Press-Citizen*, *July 25*, *1974*




