

Education Moves Forward: Ankeny Community Schools (Through 1975)

The first school was built of logs and located on the Woods farm about one mile south of Ankeny, where the east entrance of the Iowa State Experimental farm joins Highway 69. (Now the corner of Magazine Road and Ankeny Blvd.) Later this school, was relocated on the east side of Ankeny Boulevard just south of First Street.



A third move located the building to the southwest corner of West First Street. A room in the IOOF building served as an overflow room. The fourth site, selected in 1902, was the present school grounds at SW Third and School Streets. This 3-room building was soon inadequate and was torn down.

The two-story, eight-room building, erected in 1909 was to serve the community well for over 60 years until the damage of the 1974 tornado necessitated demolition rather than repair. ("Old Central", which was located where the Ankeny Area Historical Museum is now located.) Please note the original placement of "The Bell" sitting proudly atop Old Central!

Consolidation came to Ankeny in 1919 at which time the oldest part of Neveln Junior High (now part of Ankeny Community Schools District Offices) was built. Several country schools

were moved to the grounds to accommodate the increased enrollment.

There was no new construction until 1952 when the original part of the Parkview building was constructed. In 1957, the west wing was added and in 1964 an east wing was completed when Parkview became Ankeny High School. Please note "The Bell" sitting proudly in front of Parkview (right side of picture) since 1971. In 1959, an addition consisting of offices, a small gym, and classrooms joined Neveln and Old Central on the corner of SW 3rd and School Streets. As Ankeny grew from a small town to a suburb, the story of education has been one of increased enrollment and continuous building. Six buildings now house the kindergarten through fifth grade students.

Northwest Elementary on West First Street was the first building after the original Parkview building, completed in September, 1962. The second building was East Elementary which opened in 1963 at SE 3rd and SE Trilein.

Southeast Elementary on SE Trilein and SE 10th, the third building, was occupied in 1969. Running out of the points on a compass for designations, the fourth building on NW School Street was completed and opened in 1972 as Terrace Elementary.



As Ankeny moved toward its centennial observance, the first phase of a new complex on NW Ankeny Boulevard to house the high school moved toward completion in September, 1975, beginning Ankeny's second one hundred years in education.

Superintendents serving the Ankeny schools have been: 1917-1919 – H.H. Van Bentuysen; 1919-1921 – E.G. Clark; 1921-1943 – Edward W. Neveln; 1943-1947 – Cliff Evans; 1948-1951 – Ted Karges; 1951-1958 Ralph Jorgenson; 1958-1960 – Melvin Anderson; 1960-1986 – Keith Hopkins


Our monthly "Ankeny through the Decades" feature is in its seventh year!

The Bell Project

On December 23, 2020, The Bell project got real when the foundation was dug and poured for the Old Central/Parkview Bell. (See pictures below) In the spring, additional concrete work on the base will be completed. Then the Bell will be relocated and the memorial bricks will be laid.

Emails have been sent confirming the wording for your brick order. If we haven't heard from you, please contact the office to confirm the wording on your brick.

ORBIS Partners with AAHS

- Continue to offer seasonal events and decorations
- Improve display and direction signage in museum
- Incorporation of road/street signs in museum.
- Use iPads/ TVs/Speaker systems to present information
- Use up-to-date technology to access information. i.e., QR codes
- Make entryway to barn museum more inviting; Interchange entry display, better signs
- Decor for Outside of the House
