The field back of the High School is being flooded for an ice skating rink and should be open soon. There were building permits issued last year to accommodate 134 families. This means house, duplexes, etc. There was quite a discussion on who is to maintain first street. The county has been doing it till the recent snow. Paving Assessments Now Ready

Ankeny property owners who had paving laid in front of their properties or are within 300 feet of it, have received their notices of assessment and the amount due may be obtained at the city clerk's office. Property owners had twenty days to protest the assessments and that time is about up.

The cost to owners varies according to the type of paving and whether you had a curb and gutter as well as paving. Some had six inch reinforced concrete, some had six inch non-reinforced, some streets were 31 feet wide and others were twenty-five.

On Des Moines Street, average is about \$8.40 a front foot and is a little under the estimated figure. No one will have to worry anymore about slipping into ditches along the road as they did before the paving was put in. *Ankeny Times, January 8, 1959*

Iowa's minimum wage moves from \$4.25 to \$4.65 - Iowa's minimum wage will increase from \$4.25 to \$4.65 an hour effective Jan. 1, 1992. The increase will make the state's minimum hourly wage 40 cents greater than the federal minimum wage. Since April 1, 1991, the Iowa and federal minimum wage have been in the same - \$4.25. In general, most companies in Iowa will be required to pay the higher minimum wage. However, some retail and service companies are exempted from paying either the state or federal minimum wage. This list includes firms with gross annual sales of \$300,000 or less, such as grocery stores and restaurants. Also, newspapers with a circulation of 4,000 or less, are not covered by minimum wage statutes. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, January 1, 1992*

Home builders in Ankeny area are busy taking advantage of the unseasonably warm winter we have had this year. Three different crews worked Saturday in record-high 55 degree weather within a block of each other on NW Countrywood Lane in Ankeny. Ankeny Press-Citizen, January 8, 1992 Ankeny...Always Advancing – Continued planned growth has been the result of a lot of hard work and cooperation between the City of Ankeny, Ankeny Community School District, Ankeny Industrial Development Corporation, Ankeny Area Chamber of Commerce, and Des Moines Area Community College. These groups along with you, the people of Ankeny, have made this a very desirable environment to raise a family in. Ankeny has become more than a wide spot in the road just north of Des Moines. Ankeny now competes with Des Moines' western suburbs for businesses and homes and many believe the quality of life offered in Ankeny is not offered anywhere else.

About 1200 people had discovered living in Ankeny by 1950. The small city continued to grow to over 10,000 citizens by 1970 and now boasts over 18,400. City prognosticators think that Ankeny's population will top 22,000 by the turn of the century and look for 30,000 to be here in the not so distance future.

Des Moines Area Community College came to Ankeny in 1968 and now is one of the selling points for attracting businesses. The proposed Northeast Polk County Airport to be located at Ankeny's southeast border, has already begun attracting businesses to Ankeny and it hasn't even received its federal funding as of yet.

While the east and west coast have experienced over a year of recession, Ankeny continues to grow at a record pace along with Des Moines and its suburbs. Real estate sales were reported last week for 1991 to be the strongest ever in this area. Low interest rates have aided in the growth and are expected to help well into 1992. 
